## **Shakespeare On Food And Drink:**

*Shakespeare's Comic Commonwealths* Camille Wells Slight, 1993-01-01 Challenging the traditional view that Shakespeare's early comedies are about the experience of romantic love and constitute a genre called romantic comedy Camille Wells Slight demonstrates that they dramatize individual action in the context of social dynamics reflecting and commenting on the culture in which they originated *Shakespeare's Comic Commonwealths* sheds new light on ten Shakespearean comedies *The Comedy of Errors* *The Taming of the Shrew* *The Two Gentlemen of Verona* *Love's Labor's Lost* *A Midsummer Night's Dream* *The Merchant of Venice* *The Merry Wives of Windsor* *Much Ado about Nothing* *As You Like It* and *Twelfth Night* In a diversity of comic forms from rollicking farce to tragicomedy these plays offer varying perspectives on the forces that make and mar human communities Dramatizing tensions between savagery and civilization autonomy and dependence and isolation and community Shakespeare's comedies both reflect and comment on the society that produces them Slight eschews viewing these comedies as endorsements of the prevailing ideologies of sixteenth century England or as subversions of that hierarchical patriarchal culture They can be most fruitfully understood as imaginative forms that present cultural practices institutions and beliefs as human constructions susceptible to critical scrutiny While exposing the injustice and brutality as well as the assurances and satisfactions of social experiences Shakespeare's comedies represent people as inescapably social beings By combining historical scholarship with formal analysis and incorporating insights from social anthropology and feminist theory *Shakespeare's Comic Commonwealths* offers new readings of Shakespeare's early comedies and analyses the interaction between the plays and the social structures and processes of early modern England

*Eating and Ethics in Shakespeare's England* David B. Goldstein, 2013-11-07 David B Goldstein argues for a new understanding of Renaissance England from the perspective of communal eating Rather than focus on traditional models of interiority choice and consumption Goldstein demonstrates that eating offered a central paradigm for the ethics of community formation The book examines how sharing food helps build demarcate and destroy relationships between eater and eaten between self and other and among different groups Tracing these eating relations from 1547 to 1680 through Shakespeare Milton religious writers and recipe book authors Goldstein shows that to think about eating was to engage in complex reflections about the body's role in society In the process he radically rethinks the communal importance of the Protestant Eucharist Combining historicist literary analysis with insights from social science and philosophy the book's arguments reverberate well beyond the Renaissance Ultimately *Eating and Ethics in Shakespeare's England* forces us to rethink our own relationship to food

**Culinary Shakespeare** David B. Goldstein, Amy L. Tigner, 2016-05-30 Eating and drinking vital to all human beings were of central importance to Shakespeare and his contemporaries Culinary Shakespeare the first collection devoted solely to the study of food and drink in Shakespeare's plays reframes questions about cuisine eating and meals in early modern drama As a result Shakespearean scenes that have long been identified as important and influential by scholars can now be considered in terms of another revealing cultural marker that of culinary dynamics Renaissance scholars as David Goldstein and Amy Tigner point out have only begun to grapple with the importance of cuisine in literature An earlier generation of criticism concerned itself principally with cataloguing the foodstuffs in the plays Recent analyses have operated largely within debates about humoralism and dietary literature consumption and interiority working to historicize food in relation to the early modern body The essays in Culinary Shakespeare build upon that prior focus on individual bodily experience but also transcend it emphasizing the aesthetic communal and philosophical aspects of food while also presenting valuable theoretical background As various essays demonstrate many of the central issues in Shakespeare studies can be elucidated by turning our attention to the study of food and drink The societal and religious associations of drink for example or the economic implications of ingredients gathered from other lands have meaningful implications for our understanding of both early modern and contemporary periods including aspects of community politics local and global food production biopower and the state addiction performativity posthumanism and the relationship between art and food Culinary Shakespeare seeks to open new interpretive possibilities and will be of interest to scholars and students of Shakespeare and the early modern period as well as to those in food studies food history ecology gender and domesticity and critical theory *Shakespeare's the taming of the shrew* Margaret L. Randall, 1965 Shakespeare's Advice to the Players Peter Hall, 2003 Shakespeare's text is packed with clues that help the reader to hear and the performer to act any speech He also tells the actor when to go fast and when to go slow and when to accent a particular word This book sets out to make going to Shakespeare performances or acting in them a richer experience and it should have a wide appeal to both actors and audiences It also celebrates Sir Peter Hall's fifty years as a director of Shakespeare from his early days at Cambridge through founding the Royal Shakespeare Company at Stratford on Avon in the early 60s and later to his fifteen years as the director of the Royal National Theatre of Great Britain Throughout these years Peter Hall worked with the greatest Shakespearean actors of our generation including Laurence Olivier John Gielgud Edith Evans Ralph Richardson Peggy Ashcroft Charles Laughton and in later years Judi Dench Anthony Hopkins Ian Holm David Warner and many others Through this great line flows a tradition of speaking and understanding Shakespeare that remains as relevant and important today And it is Hall's experience of working and learning with these and many other actors over the years that underpins the core of this book Sir Peter Hall is one of the major figures
