Examination Thesis from the year 2008 in the subject Didactics for the subject English Literature Works grade 1 0 University of Heidelberg Anglistisches Seminar language English abstract The American literature is a reflection of the socio political developments in the different stages of the history of the country and especially slavery is a crucial topic in it Many works dealing with slavery have been published in the 19th 20th and 21st century and some of them have sparked debates that are not only on literary issues Two of these are Herman Melville's 1851 1852 *Benito Cereno* 1855 and Mark Twain's 1852 1853 *Huckleberry Finn* 1884 These two novels are often seen as major works in American literary history and their authors are among the country's most celebrated Both books have in common that their stories play in the time before the abolition of slavery *Benito Cereno* deals with a slave revolt on a ship while *Huckleberry Finn* depicts the adventures of its eponymous hero and a runaway slave Jim Another feature the novels share is the fact that both have been charged to contain racist and pro slavery attitudes This paper will evaluate and analyze these assertions in order to show that they are false because they are based on misunderstandings It aims to provide a profound delineation of the racial attitudes in the two novels The assumption here is that neither Melville nor Twain wrote racist novels This shall be
