Crosslinguistic Approaches to the Psychology of Language Jiansheng Guo, Elena Lieven, Nancy Budwig, Susan Ervin-Tripp, Keiko Nakamura, Seyda Ozcaliskan, 2010-10-18 This volume covers state of the art research in the field of crosslinguistic approaches to the psychology of language The forty chapters cover a wide range of topics that represent the many research interests of a pioneer Dan Isaac Slobin who has been a major intellectual and creative force in the field of child language development linguistics and psycholinguistics for the past four decades Slobin has insisted on a rigorous crosslinguistic approach in his attempt to identify universal developmental patterns in language learning to explore the effects of particular types of languages on psycholinguistic processes to determine the extent to which universals of language

and language behavior are determined by modality vocal auditory vs manual visual and finally to investigate the relation between linguistic and cognitive processes In this volume researchers take up the challenge of the differences between languages to forward research in four major areas with which Slobin has been concerned throughout his career language learning in crosslinguistic perspective spoken and sign languages the integration of language specific factors in narrative skill theoretical issues in typology language development and language change and the relationship between language and cognition All chapters are written by leading researchers currently working in these fields who are Slobin s colleagues collaborators or former students in linguistics psychology anthropology and cognitive science Each section starts with an introductory chapter that connects the themes of the chapters and reviews Slobin s contribution in the context of past research trends and future directions The whole volume focuses squarely on the central argument universals of human language and of its development are embodied and revealed in its diverse manifestations and utilization Crosslinguistic Approaches to the Study of Language is a key resource for those interested in the range of differences between languages and how this impacts on learning cognition and language change and a tribute to Dan Slobin s momentous contribution to the field

Moving Across Languages Alberto Hijazo-Gascón, 2021-08-23 The book analyzes the complex relationship between languages in the bilingual mind with a focus on motion event typology and the acquisition of Spanish as a second language L2 The author starts out by examining L1 patterns which are transferred to less complex L2 systems The data discussed was elicited by German learners of Spanish A similar transfer is observed when L1 is typologically and genetically close as in the case of French and Italian learners of Spanish Furthermore the author clarifies the relevance of intra typological differences within the same linguistic family including important differences in the lexicalization patterns of Italian with respect to French and Spanish The findings contribute to our understanding of the field of motion event typology and thinking for speaking The book demonstrates that conceptual transfer is present in different aspects of the motion lexicalization domain Interestingly there are some challenging aspects both for speakers whose first language is typologically different and for those whose language is typologically close The book offers suggestions on how these challenges in the restructuring of meaning in L2 can be addressed in language teaching Specifically pedagogical translation and mediation present promising pathways to the strengthening of semantic competences in the L2

Simpson,1994 *A Descriptive Analysis of Adamorobe Sign Language (Ghana)* Victoria Anna Sophie Nyst,2007 Adamorobe a small Akan village in Ghana has an unusually high incidence of hereditary deafness As a result a sign language came into being Adamorobe Sign Language AdaSL which is unrelated to any other sign language described so far and is assumed to be about 200 years old The present study describes selected aspects of AdaSL notably phonology lexicon the expression of size and shape and the encoding of motion events A comparison of these aspects with descriptions of other sign languages reveals interesting cross linguistic differences in the use of iconicity as well as in the use of space and classifier constructions Data were collected during three periods of fieldwork of nine months in total Moreover this study considers to what extent the social setting may influence the development of structural features in sign languages This investigation nuances the impact the visual spatial modality has on sign language structure The book is of interest to scholars of sign linguistics African linguistics as well as contact linguistics and Deaf studies Materials for the Hearing Impaired at New Jersey's Learning Resource Centers Therese Garavente,Patricia Holcomb,1989

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
