## Stages in children

### Infancy

#### 3 months

Child begins sitting without support

#### 6 months

Begins crawling and standing with assistance

#### 9 months

Child begins standing on their own and walking with assistance

### Early Childhood

#### 12 months

Can stand and may start to take first steps

#### 15 months

Begin to walk unassisted

#### 18 months

Able to begin stacking bricks

### Childhood

#### 2 years

Can run and walk down steps 2 feet at a time.

#### 3 years

Able to catch objects and hold a pencil to draw objects

#### 4 - 5 years

Can climb, skip, hop and can colour in neatly.
