David Eddington, 2004-12-23 Unlike most monographs on Spanish phonology and morphology that approach these topics from a structuralist or generativist framework this volume is written from a less traditional point of view More specifically it emphasizes quantitative evidence from sources such as usage based studies psycholinguistic experiments corpus data and computer simulations Arguments are presented to demonstrate that these kinds of evidence are crucial for establishing theories of language that relate to the psychological mechanisms involved in producing and comprehending speech in contrast to theories about abstract linguistic structure A range of topics is covered including morphological parsing nominalization stress syllable structure diphthongization gender morphophonemic alternations and epenthesis An appendix is included that serves as a primer on quantitative linguistic research It discusses how some of the cited experiments were carried out provides an introduction to statistical analysis and discusses tools that are available for conducting quantitative research on the Spanish language

Wolfgang Kehrein, 2002 The monograph contains two case studies dealing with the phonetics and phonology of affricates and laryngeals from a survey of 281 languages The empirical findings go counter to a number of assumptions in the literature e g 1 affricates are exclusively stops from the perspective of phonology 2 laryngeals are properties of the prosodic domains onset nucleus and coda 3 phonetic strategies affrication laryngeal phasing serve to make phonological specifications acoustically more salient Theoretical discussions include questions of phonological representation featural contours prosodic licensing etc and the phonology phonetics interface

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
